Make the Most Out of Canned Pumpkin!

It's the season of everything pumpkin. While canned pumpkin makes it easy to whip up a homemade pie, it's not the only dish this ingredient is used for. Try it in other sweet treats, such as muffins, cookies, and crumb cakes. Include pumpkin in breakfast dishes like pancakes, oatmeal, and smoothies. It can also be mixed into cream cheese for a topping on a whole wheat bagel. In savory dishes, canned pumpkin can be used in soups, stews, and curries. It adds a rich, creamy texture and pairs well with spices like cinnamon, nutmeg, and ginger.



Canned pumpkin is packed with nutrients. One-half cup is just 45 calories but has 3 grams of dietary fiber, which is considered a high-fiber food. It's an excellent source vitamin A, which is important for vision, growth and immunity. When choosing canned

pumpkin, make sure to read the label carefully. Look for 100% pure pumpkin with no added sugars.

With its long shelf life and convenience, it's no wonder why this ingredient has become a fall staple in many kitchens.

What's That Bug?

Is that a pine cone or a bug? It's actually the cocoon of a moth called a bagworm.
